

Attendance and Punctuality



- Students should be in their tutor rooms by 8:45am (in school by 8:40am).
 - Late to school is a 20 minute lunchtime detention
 Late to lesson is a 20 minute after school detention
- It is expected that **all students** attend **daily registration** (BTEC students are not in Wednesdays).
- Use the study periods they are not 'free periods'
- Responsibility to report absences/contact subject teachers
- Students must not leave site without signing out

Students who are late to school/lessons or those who have poor attendance will be placed on tutor/ AYL report. Additional processes will be used if student attendance does not significantly improve.

Some of you are still not following the dress code... You will be sanctioned everytime! - it's non-negotiable!

Dress Code

We expect you to dress in a **presentable manner**, wearing items of clothing which are **both suitable and sensible** for a working/professional environment. Please ensure the clothes you wear to school adhere to the following criteria:

- Students should wear a lanyard at all times (it should not be in a pocket or bag).
- Skirts, shorts or dresses should be mid-thigh length or below.
- No strapless, backless or low-cut items of clothing should be worn.
- No exposed underwear.
- No hats, hoods-up or gloves worn inside.
- No coats should be worn in a learning environment, e.g, classrooms, study rooms, assembly halls, library
- No slogans or clothing should be worn which could cause offence or embarrassment to others.
- Top items of clothing and bottom items of clothing should meet.
- No torn or frayed clothing.
- Sensible footwear
- If taking part in physical activities, including sports and enrichment lessons, students must wear suitable clothing. All students must wear trainers and sportswear, such as sports leggings (heavy jogging bottoms are not permitted).

If you wear a jumper/cardigan to ensure that your outfit is compliant with dress code, it must remain on at all times.








Start your application from **14 May 2024** Universities and colleges **can't see** your other choices when you apply. Apply by the equal consideration date.

Five choices, unless applying to study medicine, veterinary, medicine/science, dentistry – then it's four choices. You **can't apply to both** Oxford and Cambridge. Applying costs £28.50.

Post-18 Applications and UCAS



- Each student has a UCAS Mentor allocated to them.
- All students should have <u>completed</u> at least the first draft of their personal statement
- Students should have completed their UCAS application form and linked it to EPHS using the buzzword *Elthorne2025*
- University is not the only route:
 - L3 and 4 Apprenticeships
 - Further education courses
 - Employment
 - See Connexions (Mr Bishop)

Choosing the right place for you



- **Style** from traditional, with a focus on subject-based courses and research, to modern universities/colleges, with a greater focus on vocational courses.
- Location some are in large cities, others in small towns, by the coast or in the countryside it's all a major influence on the environment and lifestyle.
- **Size** larger universities can have more than 20,000 students, whereas some of the smallest have only a few thousand.
- **Culture and facilities** influenced by a range of factors, including the diversity of students who attend.
- What graduates do all universities collect destination statistics; it can be useful to find out what jobs or further study students go on to.
- **Tuition fees** can vary between universities and colleges; check if there are scholarships or bursaries available.
- Living costs accommodation, transport, and food can vary enormously.
